thought. When you graduate from Maybeck you will be more than ready for college and the world beyond. You will be able to appreciate and learn from voices that are not your own. You will be a strong writer. You will have confidence in your ability to analyze complex concepts and to draw your own conclusions. You will discover your own voice. You will have confidence.

Philosophy

Maybeck is a community dedicated to learning, where diversity flourishes amid mutual support, respect and responsibility. Through our small classes, high expectations, and spirit of exploration, our students prepare for college and other opportunities and acquire the tools to engage actively and creatively in the wider world.

Our community. Our seminar-style classes, camping trips, advisory program, travel programs and off-cite learning foster close relationships between students and faculty. Teachers know students by name, and students know each other across grade levels. We all meet together frequently for conversations, speakers, and programs.

Dedication to learning. Our faculty teach with passion and skill, and we expose our students to a range of teaching methods, assessments, and projects. Students choose from a variety of academic classes and electives, and some students opt to take college classes at University of California, Berkeley (Cal) or Berkeley City College (BCC). Staff meet once a week to discuss our students: their successes and their growth.

Diversity flourishes amid mutual support, respect, and responsibility.

Maybeck students come from a variety of social and economic backgrounds, cultures, traditions and faiths. We provide a safe environment for all students and all forms of diversity; students can be themselves and express themselves fully.

Programs outside of the classroom. In the fall, we hold a school-wide retreat that allows for students and staff to learn together in small and large groups on topics that emerge from readings, lectures and films. We gather under trees, by rivers, and around tables to create outdoor classrooms that hold the promise of what will come in the academic year ahead. We begin the work of learning together in generous space and with generous time to remind ourselves that learning is not a race but is a joy and a responsibility. We close the year with another retreat where we reflect on our year, speak about the change to come, and celebrate our seniors. During the year we offer trips through our program, *Maybeck Beyond*, where students are given the opportunity to participate with staff on hikes, one- and two-night camping trips, trips to Bay Area locations for lectures, museum visits, and performances, and to attend games and events on the Cal campus.

Engaging actively and creatively in the wider world: All of our students have the opportunity for travel: regional, national, and international. Additionally, all our students participate in community service projects which expose them to areas of interest beyond the classroom. Our students experience different perspectives through guest lecturers, films, and presentations.

Learning Without Walls

We supplement in-class learning with a wide range of hands-on learning experiences. Each year, our Special Programs allow teachers to craft innovative and intensive learning experiences for small groups of students. During these two-week intersessions, we immerse ourselves in eclectic adventures, which change each year based on student and staff interest and current events. Some recent program offerings: environmental exploration in Alaska, audio visual production, circus arts and dance, ceramics, travels throughout France, Guatemala, Peru, Spain, and Turkey, kayaking in Baja, examining the issues of the unhoused in the East Bay, exploring the canyons of Utah, and a stay at a Buddhist practice center.

Maybeck in the Philippines

In a recent Special Program adventure, 16 students took a 12-day journey to the Philippines. Led by two teachers—one a former Peace Corps volunteer in the region, one a former instructor with UC Berkeley's Underwater Scientific Research Diving program—the kids visited the gorgeous 2000-year-old Ifuagao rice terraces, learned to scuba dive, and explored the biodiverse tropical waters around the archipelago.

Along the way, they developed the habits of seasoned travelers, learning to orient themselves to the culture, customs, history, and geography of another country—and to pack light and travel healthy. Each student became the 'resident expert' on a topic of regional importance and presented their discoveries to the group in between excursions.

Community

At Maybeck, each student and teacher is valued for the individual contributions they make to our community. Whether under the redwoods, around the table in a seminar class, on the basketball court, in a science lab, or on the stage, each student has the chance to share their talents with their peers. We explore our differences and commonalities as we learn, grow, and deepen connections.

Our community is intentionally small. Our students form close bonds with each other and with staff as we work together, from the beginning-of-the-year camping trip to graduation. The 5:1 student-to-faculty ratio ensures that each student is known and included, and provides the opportunity for strong mentoring relationships.

We value our community time and make a point of coming together as a school at least once a week. We gather to share news, hear students perform, and discuss important topics. We meet weekly in advisory groups to hear school announcements, talk through school policy, and discuss upcoming calendar items. Staff who lead advisory groups support their students by acting as their advocate, their counselor, and their mentor. We pause classes a few times each year to explore timely topics in groups large and small.

Maybeck offers a range of affinity groups that are coordinated by our Director of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. Students gather weekly to support each other and discuss school-wide, local, national, and international topics. Affinity groups also work to bring issues and celebrations to the school at-large. In addition to affinity groups, students lead a wide variety of clubs and organizations on campus, such as Model UN Debate Team, Mycology Club, Gardening Club, Cooking Club, Math Club, Chess Club, Philosophy Club, and Skateboarding Club. Clubs change every year according to student's interests.

Maybeck's mission statement calls for mutual support, respect, and responsibility. This can only be achieved with the wholehearted involvement of our entire community which is the principle we value most.

Our History

Maybeck was founded in 1972, when four teachers at a local high school began to use seminar-style discussions to teach history, science, and literature through current events—including the Vietnam War. The school's administration objected, and the long censorship battle that ensued crystallized the four teachers' belief in teacher autonomy. They were inspired to create a school with academic freedom at its core. Thus, from the very beginning, Maybeck has been run by teachers for students.

With an enrollment of fewer than 15 in the first year, Maybeck began its life nomadically, with classes run in empty rooms at Cal. Three years later, the school had more than 60 students and had settled into the educational wing of a church across the street from Cal. Maybeck grew quickly to its current size—but has always remained small by design. The founders felt that the entire community should be able to travel anywhere together in two buses and set up camp to learn from the environment. We still believe in a classroom without walls, and still go camping together at the beginning and end of every school year.

Life Beyond Maybeck
